PLENARY 3 (PL3): The Global Challenge of Snakebite: where are we in 2016?

Professor David Lalloo



David Lalloo is Dean of Clinical Sciences and International Public Health at the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. Prof Lalloo underwent initial medical training in Newcastle upon Tyne, then trained in General (Internal) Medicine, Infectious Diseases and Tropical Medicine, spending three years in Papua New Guinea. He undertook clinical and laboratory research in Oxford before moving as Senior Lecturer to the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine in 1999. His main research interest is in clinical trials and epidemiological studies in the tropics, particularly in HIV related infections, malaria and snakebite. His current collaborations and studies include projects in Sri Lanka, Malawi,

Uganda, South Africa and Vietnam. He is a member of MRC and Wellcome Trust funding panels and chairs a number of international Trial steering groups and Data Monitoring Committees.

SUMMARY
