THE GALATURUMULA FRATERNITY

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ABSTRACT: Sri Lanka can rightly claim that she has fostered ancient education in the island by establishing a number of excellent seats of learning from the pre-Christian era. Such centres active in the middle of the Anuradhapura period have been collectively referred to as Viyat-pat -Ata -Gaṇaya.

Galaturumala was but one of them. As the Mahavamsa testifies, origin of the Galaturumula fraternity could be dated to the time of Dathopatissa 11(659-667). The location, probably, would have been the site of the Pasana Dipaka Vihara built by Mahadathika Mahanaga in the first century A. C. This place could be traceable as Kudumbigala in the panama pattu of the Ampara District.

A galaxy of many an eminent scholars of this fraternity has enlightened, as literary and inscriptional evidence show the sphere of Pali, Sanskrit and Sinhala learning till its decline with the advent of foreign powers.

- O1. In the Anuradhapura period there arose eight fraternities of the Sangha with their respective head - quarters known as Māla or Āyatana. These eight have been generally referred to as Atthamūla Vihāra, Atthāyatana and Viyatpat Ataganaya¹ Their names are: Galaturmula, Uturumula. Vilgammula,
