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Disaster Communication in Sri Lanka (A Study Based on How the Media Reported the

Tsunami in 2004)

This study attempts to analyze the reporting of the Tsunami disaster by the Sri Lankan media. The

research problem is 'Did the media act adhering to ethical conduct with responsibilities?' The

study examines how the media should act in a disastrous situation, what and what be reported and

how to report it. This dissertation consists of topics such as, identifying disasters, disaster

management in Sri Lanka, how the Sri Lankan media reported the Tsunami disaster, the role of

media in disaster communication and disaster reporting in the other countries in the world. Several

messages were selected from the electronic and print media such as television, radio and

newspapers. The main news in Sirasa TV, the live telecast on the Tsunami via Rupavahini and

three special programmes on ITN were selected from the television. Sirasa radio news, the

Tsunami programme of the SLBC 'Swadeshi Sewaya', five special programmes of the

'Commercial Service' were used among radio programmes. Headlines, middle page and editorials

of daily newspapers such as Lankadeepa and Dinamina were used. When selecting the area of

study, the researcher selected both electronic and print media and news from government and

private media channels. As primary data, the news in the media were selected. Television

recordings and radio programmes were also selected. In addition, the reactions of people to the

news was also documented. In the analyzing process an inter-subject analysis was used. The use

of pictures, letters and colours were carefully studied. In preparing maps attached in the

dissertation, software for geographical system analysis was used.
