Lankan authors to enhance the experience of learning English as a Second Language (ESL) in

that a number of other objectives would be met through this research. The use of English

literature within the ESL classroom would enhance the oral skills and reading habits of

undergraduates, facilitate critical thinking and develop awareness and sensitivity among students.

The research will be conducted through classroom-based experiments and observation. This

study will also seek to inform the production of teaching/learning materials that can be used

effectively to ensure that the teaching/learning capacity within the ESL classrooms in Sri Lankan

universities is enhanced through the use of Sri Lankan literature written in English.
